

College Sponsors Guide Dog

The students at St Mary's College have a new and particularly playful fellow 'student' - an eight-week old black Labrador puppy and trainee Guide Dog called Liam. Liam is the first Guide Dog puppy for St Mary's but the third for Deputy Principal Alex West, who joined the College in January. Alex, no doubt the only University of Melbourne residential college staff member with a play pen, dog toys and a puppy in his office, sees the College's new role as a Puppy Raiser for Guide Dogs Victoria as part of its commitment to staff and student engagement in local community service. Alex says Liam will live in the College for a year before returning to the Guide Dog Centre in Kew for further training and assessment.

"The role of a Puppy Raiser is to help socialise the puppies and to introduce them to all the sights, sounds and smells they are likely to encounter as a working Guide Dog. The College provides an ideal environment for doing this. For many students, being away from home means missing a loved pet and the opportunity to have a 'college dog' is appreciated by everyone, with the added benefit of assisting the excellent work of Guide Dogs Victoria. There is no shortage of helpers, with 160 baby-sitters available to play and help look after Liam - who clearly loves all the attention."

The St. Mary's College Library, now named the Frewin Room, has become a centre for wonderful community gatherings. The room is named in honour of Mother Francis Frewin. Principal of St. Mary's from 1944-1969. The first special occasion was held on 4 March. This was the celebration of our Commencement Mass by Father Michael Elligate with the theme Welcome, Grow, Change. A second Mass formed a central part of College Day held on 13 May. It opened with Holly de Jong playing the Trumpet Voluntary and the students reflecting on the thoughts that We are one but we are many.

During the second half of the semester the Frewin Room become a Creative Arts Centre. Music filled the room in late April for the JCR Jam which showcased a wide range of talent: seasoned performers and novices; classical to popular and comedy. The audience remained and encores continued after the program had concluded and the performers were thanked. From 19-21 May the College Play, a French farce A Flea In Her Ear was staged in the Frewin Room. To appreciative audiences, our thespians played with obvious enjoyment and talent. Parents were invited to high-tea on the Saturday and many stayed for the final play performance. On 15 August the College is hosting The Mary Ward Symposium, Spirituality and the Arts in the Frewin Room and we warmly invite you to join with us for this special evening.

would have heard Mr Allan Myers OC speak of 'his hope that this building is but the first step to the creation of a single Catholic residential college within The University of Melbourne'. For the first fifty years of St. Mary's life that was indeed the case as the Hall, as it was known, was an integral part of Newman College. Situated on separate premises both residences were considerably smaller in numbers and able to keep in close touch with individual students. Post-war reconstruction and the dramatic growth in educational opportunities led to considerable expansion in student numbers at both St. Mary's and Newman.

The granting by the Commonwealth Government of financial aid in the form both of building grants and annual subsidies made it possible for St. Mary's to meet the cost of independence and of expansion in 1966. This decision was not taken lightly with the certain knowledge that it would involve loss and gain on both sides. The deciding factor was the prospective increase in enrolments at both residences. St. Mary's considered that it would become very difficult to retain a sense of corporate unity unless the total size of the College could be kept within bounds. Combined activities continued to flourish as before, tutorials, plays, concerts, sporting and social events.

Certainly, the recent expansion of the

joint tutorial program held at the Academic Centre and the combining of our resource collections augers well for future fruitful co-operation. It is timely for us to reflect on the Mission and Ministry of St. Mary's: the diversity of choice we offer to the Catholic population of Victoria and beyond with our unique history, philosophy, religious expression, clientele, community, size and atmosphere. The pioneer of St. Mary's College, Mother Mary Gonzaga Barry IBVM, wrote in July 1895 to the then Chancellor of The University of Melbourne, Sir Anthony Brownless, about her vision of establishing a Catholic Hostel on a small scale.

"At present there is a house, 17 Burlington Terrace Lansdowne Street East Melbourne, rented by my sister Miss Barry and a sister of our late Bishop, Dr O'Connor, Mrs Murtagh these ladies have taken the house for the winter season and, to oblige us, would accommodate two or three young lay students and with good brains. The expense of board and lodging is $\pounds 1$ a week and College fees alone would be required. I think that this is a chance to make a beginning without any great outlay that we Catholics should not lose. If it were begun and succeeded in attracting students, it might lead to something of great importance."

News Around The College:

The inaugural **Deirdre Rofe**

Colloquium was held in the Frewin Room on Sunday 10 April. In 2004 the Heads of Colleges of The University of Melbourne decided to sponsor an annual colloquium to honour the exemplary contribution of Sr. Deirdre Rofe IBVM to the university and its affiliated colleges. Sr. Deirdre was Principal of St. Mary's College from 1997 until her death on 16 August 2002. The colloquium marks the affection and esteem in which Sr. Deirdre was held by her colleagues and seeks to foster the seriousness and conviviality of discourse that characterized her conception and practice of collegiality.

Fifty-five representatives of the colleges and halls of residences participated in a forum concerning "What Happened to the Full-Time Student?" The lively discussion was led by Dr. Kerri-Lee Krause of the University's Centre for the Study of Higher Education. The discourse covered the impact of the dramatic increase of part-time work undertaken during the term by undergraduates and how that work commitment influences learning styles, subject choices, participation in extracurricular activities and contribution to College community life.

New Deputy Principal and Dean - Alexander West

At the commencement of 2005 the College was delighted to welcome Alex West as our new Deputy Principal and Dean. Alex has worked as a Residential Manager at the University of Auckland New Zealand and at two residential colleges at Deakin University Geelong. His first degrees were a Bachelor of Commerce and Administration in Marketing Management and a Bachelor of Arts in World Religion and Politics from Victoria University of Wellington. He then completed a Bachelor of Divinity in Systematic Theology and Ethics from the University of Otago, Dunedin. Alex is currently working on his PhD in medical ethics.

The new Provincial Superior, Sr. Christine Burke, has recently joined the Principal's Residence at St. Mary's College. Sr.Christine has researched and written some wonderful material on the role of women in the church and published articles in the magazine *Eureka Street*. Her book *Through a woman's eyes: encounters with Jesus* has had two imprints. A member of her new Provincial Council is our former Dean, Sr. Elizabeth Hepburn. Elizabeth is currently employed by Catholic Health Australia as an Ethics Educator. In late May the College hosted ABC 774 afternoon presenter Virginia Trioli for an evening of conversation with St Mary's students. Over seventy students listened as Eliza Ginnivan (third year Media&Communications/Law) and Francis McCarthy (first year Journalism) interviewed Virginia on the role of media in society, media ethics and the challenges facing women in the media before opening the discussion to questions from the floor. Students engaged in a lively debate about recent news events, the role of media in challenging or representing society and the controversy surrounding the recent editing of an interview transcript on the ABC website. Virginia Trioli who was awarded a 2005 ABC Local Radio Award proved equal to the challenge, giving both an overview of the key issues and also raising some of the difficulties and problems faced by media researchers in balancing news, ethics, people and events, stimulating a lively and thought-provoking discussion that was echoed during the following weeks as students continued to debate both the issues and the evening's discussion.

One of our current students, **Nathan Shannon**, was recently interviewed by *The Age* newspaper about a government warning that there could be a severe shrinkage in the number of farm businesses in the future. Nathan, like many other young country Victorians has come to St. Mary's for a tertiary education and to improve his chances of finding work outside the farm. The 20-year-old student is a fourthgeneration farmer and until three years ago worked on his family's irrigation dairy farm at Numurkah, north of Shepparton.

Nathan, a third year agricultural science student, intends to return to the family business in the future, but wants to spend the next 10 to 15 years in a job that will teach him the management skills he requires for the transition. He feels that he needs to develop specialist skills in the city to give him a competitive edge when he returns to farming. While other young people are lured by high-powered city careers and big pay packets Nathan says his heart is in farming.

The 10 minute film *Birthday Boy* tells the story of a child who was orphaned during the 1950-1953 Korean War. 

Creative reconciliation:

Aboriginal histories, empathy and artistic imagination.

Dr. Donna Leslie, of the Kamileroi people of New South Wales, is the first Indigenous Australian woman to be awarded a PhD from The University of Melbourne. She is also a talented artist with a distinguished exhibition record, and holds professional qualifications in both teaching and art curatorship. Donna Leslie is currently an ARC Research Fellow in the School of Art History, Cinema, Classics and Archaeology, The University of Melbourne, and is preparing a book on the art of Australian artist Tim Johnson and aspects of the spiritual and cross-cultural dimensions of Australian art. Dr. Leslie will discuss the ways in which the artistic imagination may contribute to cross-cultural understanding and how individual creative approaches help towards reconciling history.

Bereavements

Anne Patricia Kennedy, Senior Student at St. Mary's College in 1945, died on 24 May 2005.

Pat joined St. Mary's Hall on The Avenue in 1941 to study Law. She was admitted to practice on 1 May 1947 and became a partner at Coltmans, Price and Brent located in Bourke Street. This firm later merged with Middletons. Throughout her illustrious career in the law Pat kept in close contact with the College. She wrote "The task of a Catholic College in a non-Catholic university is difficult and delicate, but so necessary and so eminently worthwhile, that for its accomplishment no labour should be held too great, and no efforts too painful." Pat did not spare herself in her work for the College.

In 1964 Pat chaired the building appeal to raise funds for a new College on Swanston Street, located within the university grounds and affiliated with university. St. Mary's Hall, which had served the community since 1918, was no longer large enough to accommodate the number of students seeking admission. Pat was also treasurer of the Centenary University Building Appeal and Vice-President of the Victorian Women Graduates' Association and past president of the Legal Women's Association. In August 1968 she became an inaugural member of the St. Mary's College Council and served until 1984. Speaking at a dinner and reception to mark the College's 60th anniversary Pat emphasised that the broad educational experience of living in St. Mary's had lasted long after her formal academic studies had ended and perhaps had been forgotten.

Gabrielle Pizzi (neé Wren) died on 5 December 2004. Following her education at Sacré Coeur Gabrielle came to St. Mary's Hall in 1959 to study Arts. After university Gabrielle worked in art galleries in Rome and Paris before retuning to Melbourne and establishing herself as an art dealer. Gabrielle will be remembered for championing contemporary Aboriginal artists and promoting their work long before it was fashionable to do so.
